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EPC Sayings

One way to see what a community values is to note the catchphrases of the community. Here are some phrases or sayings that I associate with EPC. What ones would you add?

- God is the love in which I forgive.
- Now-change-trust: God's kingdom is right now; I am willing to change my heart and mind; I chose trust. *(from Mark 1)*
- My command is this: Love each other as I have loved you. (from John 15)
- The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, trust, gentleness, and self-control. Against such things there is no law. *(from Galatians 5)*
- Everything is either an expression of love or a call for love. Everything.
- I don't need love; I am love.
- The opposite of love is fear.
- It is for freedom that Christ set us free. (again Galatians 5)
- Deep calls to deep. (from Psalm 42)
- Holy Spirit, in this holy moment, you be in charge, and we will follow you, trusting that your direction leads to peace.

Consider taking one of these sayings and making it your own this week. Make an art card and put it by your bedside, or set your phone alarm to go off each hour with this reminder, or spend five minutes meditating in the morning and evening around your chosen saying. The Holy Spirit wants to support your spirit. Let her in and see what miracles emerge!

<u> June Mission: Kafika House</u>

On Sunday, June 1st, Ron and Ingrid Eggert introduced our mission of the month, Kafika House in northern Tanzania. Ron spoke from his experience of 9 years serving as the physician at a Lutheran teaching hospital. Children in the region suffered in disproportionate numbers

from cleft palate, club foot, hydrocephalus, and devastating burns from cooking fires. Volunteer surgeons came regularly to operate on up to 70 children in a 2-week period.

At Kafika House, children receive loving care until they are able to return home – for a week or up to several months. Prior to their surgeries, many of these children have been hidden away due to their disabilities. Arriving at Kafika House marks the first time that they have unlimited nutritious food, playmates and peers, education, and the opportunity to truly embrace childhood.

<u>The Tale of Two Edgecumbes</u>

When we hear the name Edgecumbe, for most of us, it's Edgcumbe Presbyterian Church in St. Paul, a place of faith, reflection, and community. For others though, it's the quiet, powerful silhouette of Mount Edgecumbe rising over Sitka Sound in Alaska. On the surface, they couldn't be more different. One is a volcano; the other, a church. One is shaped by tectonic forces; the other, by human need and spiritual care. But in their own ways, both stand as symbols of strength and quiet presence.



Mount Edgecumbe is a dormant volcano—at least, that's what was thought until recently. Long silent, it has begun to stir beneath the surface. Small earthquakes and uplift remind us that even what was still may simply be waiting. It is a place of quiet power and watchfulness, long respected by the Tlingit people and by all who live in its shadow.

Our church that bears the same name in St. Paul has also stood watch for generations. Tucked into a quiet neighborhood, it has served as a center of spiritual life, welcome, and renewal. Like many faith communities, it has offered people a place to reflect, to gather strength, and to rebuild in the face of change. The name Edgecumbe links these two very different places, inviting us to see a shared meaning in their stories.

The name of the volcano came from empire. It is a British admiral's name given to the mountain by 18th-century explorers. But over time, that name has come to represent rootedness, renewal, and resilience. One Edgecumbe offers a view of the natural world; the other, a window into human community. So whether you find yourself on a trail to a crater rim or walking through the doors of a church sanctuary, may the spirit of Edgecumbe, rooted in quiet strength and shaped by time, remind us that renewal often begins in stillness.
